Working with the Community

High school students continue to gain knowledge and experience through Community Connect on a weekly basis, with school staff working in collaboration with local members and local service providers like **Bynoe** and **Mission Australia**. Students engage with a variety of activities to gain exposure and experience work opportunities on and off the island.

Last week a group of high school girls visited the Women's Place to participate in an arts and crafts activity as part of Ochre Week. The girls created empowering canvas artworks inspired by strong women and strong families, an activity to combat and create awareness around the



impacts of domestic and family violence in Aboriginal and Torres Strait communities. Thank you to Farrah, Ross and the teams at Mission Australia and Bynoe for your ongoing support and enthusiasm when it comes to our students.

Routines and Behaviour in 1/2B

In 1/2B, we have been working hard to establish routines so that we feel confident

coming to school and being in the classroom. We have practised walking safely in a straight line between classes and sitting on the carpet showing five star listening. That means we have our eyes looking towards the speaker, ears listening, mouth closed, legs crossed and hands in our lap. During rotations, we have been practising taking turns and sharing with our friends, packing up and following instructions first time, every time.

This year, 1/2B will have 2 teachers: during 'even weeks' Miss Lisa will teach the class while Miss Eliza will take the class during 'odd weeks'. This is so that Miss Lisa can help the whole school to teach phonics and Miss Eliza can help Pa Johnny and Nanna Betty teach local language.

School & Community Engagement

This year has brought new and exciting possibilities for our students as the hard work of school staff and service providers to engage and connect with students' learning comes to fruition. The school will continue to thrive for the greatest connections with all service providers, as we understand the significance and importance for our students to connect, grow and learn in a supportive environment both in and out of the school environment.

Below are some examples of projects and highlights for this year, with many more to come:

Culture Lessons: In collaboration with **Mirndiyan Arts Centre**, our students now receive their culture lessons at the Arts Centre, with the support and guidance of local staff members Lawrence, Roxanne and Berylene, as well as the elders, artists and John the Centre Manager. **Mornington Shire Council** and the **Dragon's Den Butchers** have also been very supportive in the development of a sustainable transport schedule for the students.

Language: Our long term employees and valued contributors to student learning, Betty & Johnny,



continue to work alongside school staff to create and deliver the language lessons. Along with Ms Eliza, they will continue to collaborate with local elders to develop, implement and maintain the delivery of local Language lessons for students in Kindy to High School.

Technology Bush Trips: Even with the wet weather conditions, staff are doing their best to connect the high school students with local traditional owners and elders, deliver-



ing technology lessons specific to our environment and community. Ross and his staff from **Bynoe** have been one of our key service providers to assist, and we are keen to connect and engage with other service providers as the year progresses.

Alternative & Pathway classes: The school acknowledges the need to cater for all levels and types of student learning needs, so have taken the innovative step to include three extra classes this year. Ms Georgie, Ms Cassie & Mr Des are responsible for these classes; catering and delivering to the individual needs of their students, with the intention of re-engaging students into mainstream classes.

Boarding School: School staff continue to work alongside boarding schools to assist in enrolments and engagement of families with boarding schools off the island. The choice of boarding school and age of enrolment is at the family's discretion; school staff are able to assist with documentation and communication relevant to the family's choice of boarding school.

Sports: School staff have been working tirelessly to coordinate sporting activities for the students with lunch time sports, potential Basketball & AFL Gulf district trials, as well as upcoming Athletic carnivals. School staff acknowledge that teaching in a small community means being part of that community, and often volunteer to engage.

<u>No School, No Shop!</u>

Furthering our community engagement, Gununamanda Store are always keen to donate, promote and support the school whenever required, from promoting school attendance to offering prize donations. Most importantly, the shop support 'Every Day Counts' for attendance - meaning unaccompanied children should not be at the shop during school hours.



Attendance Matters

Good attendance at school is linked to greater success, we are therefore asking for all parents/carers support to ensure that students achieve the highest possible attendance. You can do this by bringing your child to school EVERY DAY unless your child is too ill to attend. We have dedicated members of staff that support families who experience difficulties in ensuring their child's full attendance. If you are experiencing difficulties, please do not hesitate to contact our dedicated staff who can offer you support.

Tips to help you get children to school on time every day:

- Make sure your child understands why school is important
- Show your child that you are interested in what they have done at school
- Get everything ready the night before school
- Arrange appointments before or after school or during the schools holidays
- Set your alarm and your child's alarm clock see who can beat the clock!
- Join breakfast club at school
- Catch an earlier bus or set off a little bit earlier if you walk
